Unit Description

Join church history lecturer Marge Mills in following in the footsteps of the European Reformers of the 16th century. See Martin Luther's homes, the site of the 95 theses, Worms where he made his stand against the Emperor, the Wartburg Castle where he hid out, and many churches where he preached the gospel. Then onto where Jan Hus was sentenced, Zurich where Zwingli brought reform, and Geneva with all of the John Calvin sites. Understand the Reformation by being there!

Learning Outcomes

- (a) To enable you to spend a significant period of time in one or more remote location relevant to the unit content;
- (b) To assist you to gain an appreciation of the local features, that may include culture, geographical and topographical factors and perspectives in the understanding of the biblical narratives;
- (c) To help you to appreciate the impact of distant areas on the understanding of the biblical narratives, themes and perspectives;

Content

This unit is available to students who spend a period of time in one or more of the lands associated with the biblical documents, or a context relevant to the unit content. The criteria for eligibility for credit for the unit shall be:

1. A minimum of 80 hours work, including lectures, field trips and/or an archaeological dig and/or field work, in an integrated programme conducted by a person or teaching body endorsed by Mary Andrews College.
2. Assessment should include a substantial project relating a significant section to the land(s) visited by you.
3. The project could include a daily journal as part of the documentary evidence for it.

Study Tour Limits
